

September 8, 2017

Hundred Foot Journey (2014)

Discussion Leader: Ivy Ruark

In "The Hundred-Foot Journey," Hassan Kadam (Manish Dayal) is a culinary ingénue with the gastronomic equivalent of perfect pitch. Displaced from their native India, the Kadam family, led by Papa (Om Puri), settles in the quaint village of Saint-Antonin-Noble-Val in the south of France. Filled with charm, it is both picturesque and elegant—the ideal place to settle down and open an Indian restaurant, the Maison Mumbai. That is, until the chilly chef proprietress of Le Saule Pleureur, a Michelin starred, classical French restaurant run by Madame Mallory (Academy Award -Winner Helen Mirren), gets wind of it. Her icy protests against the new Indian restaurant a hundred feet from her own, escalate to all-out war between the two.

October 13, 2017

ME BEFORE YOU (2016)

Discussion Leader: Peggy Donaldson

This is the story of a caretaker and paralyzed man, and deals with right-to-die issues. Adapted from the bestselling novel by Jo Jo Moyes, "Me Before You" tells the story of the relationship that blossoms between a contented small town Englishwoman and the wealthy, paralyzed Londoner who hires her as his caretaker.

November 10, 2017

HIDDEN FIGURES (2016)

Discussion Leader: Mickey Miller

This is the incredible untold true story of Katherine G. Johnson (Taraji P. Henson), Dorothy Vaughan (Octavia Spencer) and Mary Jackson (Janelle Monáe)—brilliant African-American women working at NASA, who served as the brains behind one of the greatest operations in history. The launch of astronaut John Glenn into orbit was a stunning achievement that restored the nation's confidence, turned around the Space Race, and galvanized the world. The visionary trio crossed all gender and race lines to inspire generations to dream big.

December 8, 2017

GIFTED (2016)

Discussion Leader: Roger Kragt

Frank Adler (Chris Evans) is a single man raising a child prodigy—his spirited young niece Mary (Mckenna Grace)—in a coastal town in Florida. Frank's plans for a normal school life for Mary are foiled when the seven-year-old's mathematical abilities come to the attention of Frank's formidable mother Evelyn (Lindsay Duncan,) whose plans for her granddaughter threaten to separate Frank and Mary. Octavia Spencer plays Roberta, Frank and Mary's landlady and best friend. Jenny Slate is Mary's teacher, Bonnie, a young woman whose concern for her student develops into a connection with her uncle as well.

January 12, 2018

NOBLE (2014)

Discussion Leader: Ivy Ruark

They broke everything but her spirit. They took everything but her dream. This is the incredible true story of a fearless Irish heroine driven by her daring vision to escape the slums of Ireland and risk everything on the streets of Vietnam.

February 9, 2018

THE SHACK (2017)

Discussion Leader: Elizabeth Deibert

Based on the New York Times best-selling novel, "The Shack" takes us on a father's uplifting spiritual journey. After suffering a family tragedy, Mack Phillips [Sam Worthington] spirals into a deep depression causing him to question his innermost beliefs. Facing a crisis of faith, he receives a mysterious letter urging him to an abandoned shack deep in the Oregon wilderness. Despite his doubts, Mack journeys to the shack and encounters an enigmatic trio of strangers led by a woman named Papa [Octavia Spencer]. Through this meeting, Mack finds important truths.

QUEEN OF KATWE (2016)

Discussion Leader: Barbara & Denny Noto

"Queen of Katwe" is the colorful true story of a young girl selling corn on the streets of rural Uganda whose world rapidly changes when she is introduced to the game of chess, and, as a result of the support she receives from her family and community, is instilled with the confidence and determination she needs to pursue her dream of becoming an international chess champion.

SECRET LIFE OF BEES (2016)

Discussion Leader: Iim Padula

Set in South Carolina in 1964, the film is the moving tale of Lily Owens a 14 year-old girl who is haunted by the memory of her late mother. To escape her lonely life and troubled relationship with her father, Lily flees with Rosaleen, her caregiver and only friend, to a South Carolina town that holds the secret to her mother's past. Taken in by the intelligent and independent Boatwright sisters, Lily finds solace in their mesmerizing world of beekeeping, honey and the Black Madonna.

A MAN CALLED OVE (2016)

A Swedish comedy-drama film based on author Fredrik Backman's 2012 book of the same name. In the leading role as Ove is Rolf Lassgård. Ove is the quintessential angry old man next door. New Organ for Sanctuary

We are about to order the new organ for our new sanctuary. It is an Allen Bravura-3 manual with antiphonal speaker and is fitted with the ability to add pipes to it in the future. It goes

beyond the capabilities of most organs with recording abilities, thousands of combinations and best of all is made in Macungie, PA.

The company is building the organ to Gia's specifications. Allen builds every part of their instrument in their own plants. Don Deibert—chairman, Karl Fleger, and Gia have worked very closely with Ted Hayes—our musical consultant and his company Dunne Music of Florida. He has worked for the Allen Company since 1973. Ted is also the organist at First Presbyterian church in Bradenton.

The organ costs were very high but Ted worked with Don and they got it to a wonderful price for all that we are getting. The final figure is \$88,000, of which we have collected \$50,000. We have ordered the organ and now need to collect \$38,000 for the last payment before installation.

- A free breakfast, lunch or snack depending on the time of their appointment.


Thanks to your generous contributions in terms of money, time and talent this day was memorable for all. 20 people



The Latest on Sanctuary Building Progress

Here is the most recent report from the Building Vision Team on the progress of the construction of the Sanctuary.

- 1. Construction and architectural documents are in the Manatee County permit approval process and we expect to have County approval in a couple of weeks.
- 2. Our contractor, Willis Smith, put the project out for competitive bid.
- 3. The competitive bid generated a guaranteed, maximum price of \$2,872,000 which exceeds the previous cost estimate by \$317,000.
- 4. We are addressing the excess cost in three ways as follows:
 - a. Reduce the scope of the work by postponing the construction of the covered drop-off structure and the covered walkway between the two buildings.
 - b. Additional financing from PILP (Presbyterian Investment and Loan Program) has been secured and approved by Session, the Congregation and Presbytery.
 - c. Additional cost cuts are being pursued through a Value Engineering approach to construction.

We are confident we will mitigate the excess cost and deliver a quality Sanctuary structure for the Peace congregation.



Peace Crafters AKA Blessed Hands

What have Peace Crafters been up to this summer? We have been collecting 7" by 9" knitted or crocheted samplers. We are binding these together to make into blankets, which will be given to "Turning Points" in the late fall. We continue to make baby blankets and prayer shawls as well.

We will resume meetings in September on the 1st and 3rd Fridays of the month from 10 am until 12 noon. Anyone can join. The Crafters are for everyone who is interested, not just knitters and crocheters, but painters, scrapbookers, beaders, metal workers, and quilters, and anyone who likes to work with their hands.



A very generous \$595 was collected from our congregation for the grateful Farmworker's Community. At Beth-El's request, 30 larger, more durable high school back packs and five cases of

composition notebooks were delivered along with a variety of elementary school supplies. Peace's donations helped these kids start the school year with dignity and the confidence to succeed among their peers.
