
At Cedarkirk, the campers from Peace Church found the “best camp ever”, in spite of the ban on electronics during the week. They found a whole different world from their schools, with new friends, Bible study every day, activities the whole camp participated in, and they learned that “all are leaders, all are followers.”



The high school students who spent a week at Montreat, North Carolina, found ways to feel closer to God. The theme, “Our Stories are Intertwined,” brought intense emotions to the surface in the small groups of 20, among people they had never met. They realized you can’t tell at face value what a person is like. Kim Adams, our Pastoral Intern for Children, Youth, & Families, agreed. “The theme allowed people to dig deep” and it was the most memorable time at Montreat she has experienced.

In Colossians, Paul wrote, “from the first day we heard of you, we haven’t stopped praying for you, asking God to give you wise minds and spirits attuned to his will, and so acquire a thorough understanding of the ways in which God works.” (Col 1:9, The Message). To help in you acquire “wise minds and spirits attuned to God’s will” Peace will offer several Lively Learning opportunities for adults this coming fall.

We’re thankful to **Craig and Kathleen Hardesty** who will revive Nooma for four Sundays, 9/20–10/18 on the theme “What Does God Want from us?” in Room 9.

**Bill Clough** and **Peg Papsch** will lead the second iteration of Bible from Scratch, the New Testament. The New Testament, the distinctively Christian Scriptures, are shorter than the Old and the personalities of the authors of the books stand out more. It will run 9/20–11/22 in the Gathering Room.

On Thursday, September 3, Peace hosted a meeting of the Northern section of the Peace River Presbytery. Rather than having a meeting of the entire Presbytery (all 39 congregations), the smaller gathering allowed for member churches to make acquaintances with the churches that are in a closer geographical area.

The meeting took place in the morning, and along with time for worship and fellowship, small groups were formed to briefly discuss methods of outreach for individual churches. The discussions not only looked at methods of bringing people to the front door, but what happens after they walk in and sit down.

The “welcoming process” of any church depends on all the members of the congregation. How people feel when they leave Peace is not just the role of the teams “in charge” of outreach, congregational care, fellowship, but it depends on all of us. Guests need to receive a smile, a hand, and a kind word.
