Our daughter Rebecca is working on a doctorate in clinical psychology, but before she started that degree, she introduced me to the concept of narrative medicine. This is the commitment to understanding patients' lives, caring for the caregivers, and giving voice to suffering. When I heard about it, I was tempted to say, "Duh, isn't that what all medicine, all ministry, and all relationships should be focused on listening to people's lives, hearing their struggles?"

At Peace we have a large group of adults working on their listening skills as we discuss the many ways one can be fully present to another person's narrative. Our personal stories and the ability to share them are fundamental to human wellbeing. In his book Between the Listening and the Telling, Mark Yaconelli, says that storytelling can save us.

Here's the irony, Yaconelli says: we consume more narratives than any generation before us, but we are more isolated. We watch many stories on screens, tell our stories on social media, and then still feel alone. We need the nourishment of human community, but we get the fast food of screen-time glances at one another's lives, without really taking face-to-face time to build nourishing relationships.

I challenge you to find some small group or at least some individual person at Peace to whom you can listen well and with whom you can entrust your own narrative. (Let me know if you want help doing this.) I hope you are moving beyond small talk in fellowship at Peace. I hope you will consider being in a Lenten small group, if you are not already in a group of two or three or eight or ten gathered in the name of Jesus, where you can build strong bonds



of relationship through storytelling. If you need to zoom these face-to-face times, we have groups for you too.

Here's the challenge—listening to one another's narratives is a big investment. Think of Jesus with Mary and Martha—Mary listening, Martha needing to slow down. Think of Jesus with the woman at the well, one of the longest recorded conversations he had with anyone. Remember the late-night conversation of Jesus and Nicodemus. Authentic relationships take time and energy, but they are worth it.

Love and Peace at Manatee Pride

The Presbyterian (USA) Church in Jackson was one of the few places in Mississippi where Leslie and I always found respect, friendship, and affirmation of our marriage. This transformative experience of God's love and grace solidified my desire to pursue ordained ministry.

When Leslie and I moved to Florida, we desperately hoped to find a more tolerant place to live. Unfortunately, discrimination

has gradually arisen against sexual and gender minorities in Florida. We're gaining a national reputation as USA Today reports families leaving the state to find a safer place to raise their kids.

There is so much wonderful inclusivity at Peace Presbyterian Church, yet the broader PC(USA) has also struggled with its promises of welcoming all God's children.

The Covenant Network of Presbyterians is an LGBTQ advocacy ministry within the PC(USA) where I work parttime. Last year, we received a record number of requests from PC(USA) churches seeking resources, educational programs, and other support for sexual and gender minorities.

For example, one session elder reached out in despair over the loss of a faithful gay congregant driven away by other members who "just don't get it." A pastor called with genuine fear about what would happen if their gender identity was ever discovered by their church. From small churches to large



presbyteries, in Mississippi and in Florida, people are not yet living at peace with the diversity of sexuality and gender.

My prayer is that Peace's attendance at Manatee Pride at the Bradenton Riverwalk on March 11 will bring some small measure of peace to someone in need—like last year, when one Peace member spoke with an elderly gay woman who was happily surprised to learn that LGBTQ people can become members here.

Long ago, a teacher gave me a card where she had written Matthew 5:16 — "...Let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father in heaven." Under the verse, she wrote, "Always let your light shine."

This message was a light in my own life as I came to terms with my orientation. On the Sundays leading up to Manatee Pride, the Outreach Team will have cards and pens available at a table in the narthex where you can write encouraging notes. These will be handed out at Pride, and sample messages (like "God loves you" and "you are beloved by God") will be provided so you don't have to think on the spot!

Whether or not you can attend Manatee Pride, you can bless the community with messages of God's love and let Peace's light shine.

There will be several outreach events in February, including Night of Worship and Praise on Friday, Feb. 3 at 7 p.m., Lakewood Ranch Wind Ensemble Concert on Sunday, Feb. 5 at 2 p.m., and Blessing of the Animals on Sunday, Feb. 26 at 3 p.m. The Lakewood Ranch Wind Ensemble closes out its concert series at Peace on Sunday, March 5 with a performance at 2 p.m. followed by a reception for all concert attendees in Fellowship Hall. On Saturday, March 11, the Outreach Team will host a booth for Peace at the Manatee Pride Festival from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. on the Bradenton Riverwalk (see updated handout to the right).

Expressing gratitude is a lot more than saying thank you. Emerging research has recently started to draw attention to its multiple benefits. People who are consistently grateful have been found to be relatively happier, more energetic, and more hopeful and to report experiencing more frequent positive emotions. They also tend to be more helpful and empathic, more spiritual and religious, more forgiving, and less materialistic than others who are less predisposed to gratefulness. Furthermore, the more a person is inclined to gratitude, the less likely he or she is to be depressed, anxious, lonely, envious, or neurotic.

We visited Herrmann's Royal

Lipizzans in Myakka City on January 26. The Herrmann Family has owned and operated Herrmann's Royal Lipizzans since 1962, training and showing horses. The Lipizzan is one of the most famous, yet endangered, breeds in the world. During World War II, the horses, nearly exclusively owned by the Austrian government, were seized and held by Russian forces. Hearing of their plight and threat of extinction for these beautiful white horses, General George Patton implemented "Operation Cowboy" where he sent forces into Russia to evacuate close to 300 mares, stallions and foals from behind enemy lines. In appreciation for their efforts, the Spanish Riding School of Vienna gave the American forces a private performance after the horses were rescued. In 1962, the Herrmann family brought their Lipizzans to the US and are now in the sixth generation of Herrmann riders at their winter training facility. The group also ate lunch before the performance at Silver Star East Restaurant.

Looking forward to having a special Valentines Fellowship time on February 12.





Don't miss the Small Group Lenten campaign!

The month of March will be very important for our Peace community as we grow and celebrate the love of Jesus Christ in our lives through small groups.

Jesus said, *"For where two or three are gathered in my name, there I will be with them."* (Matthew 18.20). As his followers, we need the support and encouragement

we need the support and encouragement from other believers. In small groups, we can more easily experience the presence of Jesus in our lives. We can share our struggles and our dreams, our needs and

our gifts. The Spirit is alive and active where people come together to listen and grow. This is an opportunity you should not miss!

Each small group will meet for five weeks during Lent. After this initial experience, each group may decide if they want to continue to meet, when they will meet, and how often.

Small groups have been a very important part of my life and helped me to explore my gifts and have helped me to make many life-long friends. It takes time for relationships to grow, so I hope each group will seriously pray about continuing to meet in some way.

These five small group sessions will focus on reading selected chapters from the book, *SHARING FOOD*, a book about hospitality and food, written by L. Shannon Jung. The

five sessions will be about "Enjoying Food," "Hospitality," "Fasting and Feasting," "Preparing Food" and "The Lords Supper." While we read about sharing food, we also hope to share some small meals or snacks together.



Mission News

God uniquely gives to all of us and these gifts are meant to be shared! The Mission Team helps us put our gifts to meaningful use by providing opportunities for all of us to give and serve. Our team has big hearts and a passion for helping others. Everyone is invited to join us—whether for a specific event, a recurring volunteer opportunity, or as a team member.

The Mission team continues to be very busy! Peace volunteers provided ~ 4500 volunteers hours (equivalent to ~ \$134,000) to our mission partners in 2022. We also contributed \$90,576 (16% of Peace's operating budget) to our missions and partners. The Spirit of Giving event on December 4th was very successful, generating ~ \$5000 for our mission partners and increasing awareness of the wonderful work they do in our community. We are very grateful for our generous congregation, which also donated 45 Christmas shoeboxes for homebound clients of Meals on Wheels Plus,

Congregational Care

While the purpose of the Congregational Care Team is "to nurture authentic relationships and pray for the congregation...," some may wonder what else the team does "in the spotlight" or "behind the scenes." Trained Stephen Ministers provide one-on-one confidential care to people after a divorce, death, or other life crisis. Other visible ways you

might see this team of 17 smaller Care Group Leaders at work include: being the recipient of cards for joyful or sorrowful occasions; the occasional hospital or home visit; the provision of a meal or ride to an appointment; receiving a caring phone call, e-mail or text; transporting members to Sunday worship; attending funerals; sending prayer requests and praying daily for every Peace member by name! In fact, 380 prayer requests were received in 2022. On December 11, three team members, along with church staff, and Eirinn with her faithful, friendly CYF group spread Christmas cheer by visiting and caroling with several of our homebound. This joyful caravan also included a stop at Westminster where several Peace folks reside. Just 13 days after bringing the Christmas message and singing with Sue McClurg, she would be called home on Christmas Eve to her eternal

rest. On December 23, Pastor Elizabeth, the Team's Elder, and Amy Cerniglia celebrated a meaningful communion service and carols with Bill Kemp, a retired minister, and his family at PAM Rehabilitation Hospital.

While serving others in these various ways, the Congregational Care Team is living out part of Peace's Mission in **"...caring for the needs of others."**

During the recent Team Leader and Elder

planning meeting, our team summarized the top three accomplishments in 2022. With the pandemic in mind, Peace successfully transitioned to larger in-person congregation with adjustments in how Communion is served in the Congregation and in choir. We developed our AV Group, with a new livestream leader and teen to make improvements in our virtual worship and recruited two new members to the team and many new members to Voices of Peace, Bell Choir, and Drama Ministry.

The Worship team also planned for the 2023 top three goals. They are to build upon this past year's growth and training with new liturgists, acolytes, and musicians, to increase the number of team members working closely with the staff and to provide worship that is uplifting, including Communion preparation, music and drama, and special services.

Among recent accomplishments, the Carols, Candles and Live Nativity on the Peaceful Path on December 18 drew a large crowd of those from nearby neighborhoods as well as Peace members. There were also numerous people who came into the sanctuary to light a candle or sit quietly and to meet Santa and sample cookies in the Peace Center. Christmas Eve Service was well-attended with many youth participating in readings and music

Recent audio-visual report: there are typically 12–14 families watching on our Livestream. At their last A/V meeting, the sub-team discussed working on a process for the Livestream and sound people. They will also be hanging the microphones in the choir loft to make it safer and more effective. The team hopes to use only one laptop in the future instead of two to simplify the process. They also hope to purchase one more camera. The Worship and Music Team hopes to create a more welcoming experience on-line and inperson.

In addition to increasing opportunities for kids, the Team will provide more support to the Pastor, with Communion preparation, and flowers.


