Peace Presbyterian has accepted the invitation to become a Matthew 25 Church, by compassionately serving the least of these who are hungry, poor, or oppressed. On Feb. 23, twenty nine (29) intergenerational Peace folks participated in CROP Walk by securing pledges and walking 3 miles between



Palmetto and The Bradenton Riverwalk via the Green Bridge. Two 4-legged members, "Olive" Huber and "Chloe" Camphire also

enjoyed the simple fellowship, great exercise, and magnificent views over the Manatee River. Dubbed the "granddaddy of charitable walks," CROP (Christian Rural Overseas Project) was started in 1947 to help feed those in need post WW II. Approximately \$15, 615 was raised for Church World Service by the 14 participating Manatee County churches. Peace Church raised \$1,949, 25% of which stays in Manatee County to help combat hunger. October 11 Peace Forum on Incarceration and Rehabilitation

The October 9 Faith and Film movie is *The Mustang*—about a man, Roman, in a prison situated in the Nevada desert. Assigned to do "outdoor maintenance," Roman observes some of the other inmates working with wild mustangs, led by Myles (Bruce Dern), the crusty and critical trainer in charge of the program. Based on a true story.

In connection with the movie, on Sunday, October 11 at 5:00 p.m. there will be a Peace Forum on Incarceration and Rehabilitation lead by Peace people who have experience with criminal justice systems in the U.S.

The Peace Forum is a time and place for talking and learning about the important issues of our lives. We talk



about those things that concern us: our lives, our futures, and those of our children and grandchildren.

Incorporating Presbyterian values going back 500 years to the Reformation, we are working to transform society, to develop and protect the resources of nature for the common welfare, to work for justice and peace in society, and to use

God's creative power for the fulfilment of human life. (The Confession of 1967)

At Peace Forums we discuss matters with full civility, listen deeply, and respect persons with different perspectives, and "commit to being uneasy" in our diverse life together.

I am pleased to report that in the last month, our Facebook page has had 8,000 unique visitors; we have over 400 followers; and almost 3,000 people viewed one or more videos. We are making a difference in our community.

She put on a terrific one-woman show, and had all of us singing along. It was a joy to see one of the local senior communities bringing two vans! There will be more concerts in the future.

You will be glad to know that Nicky Mullins, U of F Extension office, is consulting with us to plan for that area. It will be a safe, calm place to walk or sit and meditate. 

Seeking comfort during this tumultuous time, I've turned to the Glory to God hymnal, particularly the settings of the psalms. These are hymns we don't often sing, as the appropriate psalm may not appear very often in the lectionary, but several seem to speak especially to this time. For example, the setting of Psalm 31 for Palm Sunday declared, "As for me, I trust in you, O Lord...you deliver me." The Psalm 22 setting for Good Friday boldly stated, "You are a stronghold for all the oppressed; hear us, O God! Let your people be blessed."

On the same YouTube channel as our Peace worship services, I've uploaded recordings of some of these psalms, which can be hard to find on the Internet. The rhymed verses help me to remember the Scripture's message. After all the practice it takes for me to learn the music, I wind up with psalms replaying in my head, even without conscious thought. If you have a Glory to God hymnal at home, consider browsing and learning a setting of your favorite psalm. Music has such

Cedarkirk officially closed to guest groups in the middle of March and will remain closed until the end of April. We are monitoring announcements from the CDC and staying in contact with our local Dept. of Health to keep abreast of current recommendations. It is likely that we will extend our current closure and remain closed into May as well. This is difficult on us financially as our income is \$0 right now, but we'll weather the storm with the help of a dedicated staff and Board, and the prayers of our faithful constituents. God has been faithful to Cedarkirk for 49 years and we are confident God will see us through this.

Currently, we are hoping to run at least some portion of summer camp (fingers crossed!), though we recognize those programs will look somewhat different this summer in light of COVID-19. Our program team is also working on developing a "virtual" program for our summer campers in the event we cannot host residential camp. This would allow us to stay engaged with campers and their families.

Cedarkirk has enough cash reserves to operate at its current level for four months. After that, we would need to begin making some rather drastic cost-saving measures, which would likely include a significant furlough or layoff of staff, as that is our greatest expense. One bright spot is that we have been able to find jobs around camp for our hourly kitchen staff so that they can continue to receive a paycheck during

these challenging times.

Despite all of the uncertainty surrounding the next weeks and months, we have still been able to live our mission. Jackie and the kitchen staff wanted to use up some of the food that won't last until our next groups arrive. They cooked all of the hams and turkeys in the freezer, made some fresh bread and cookies, and were able to build more than 100 sandwiches.

Mark got into contact with the Redlands Christian Migrant Association down in Wimauma and they were able to provide those sandwiches and cookies to the food-insecure folks they serve in their community. It's good to know that even in challenging times, God provides opportunities for us to love and serve others.

We were also able to donate some perishables to Presbyterian Church of Seffner to be used in their Meals on Wheels program.
