A Broken Bell

I had an interesting, yet insightful experience one morning at church.

Our bell choir was going to play for the first time since "live," in-person worship services were discontinued due to COVID-19 a few weeks before Easter 2020. That was the second year I'd played in the bell choir, and my bell playing had improved. The pieces we had practiced for several weeks were familiar tunes, but we knew we needed to accept the move to recorded and/or Zoom services without musical accompaniment for the health and safety of all. Early spring 2021 worship services were provided in-person outdoors with everyone attending bringing lawn chairs and coats & blankets to keep warm-but no music or singing included. Once it was determined that most church attendees had received both COVID-19 vaccinations, worship services were moved back into the air-conditioned(!) sanctuary—but wearing masks and sitting spaced apart. Still no singing, but the organ and pianos provided music.

Finally, we felt it would be safe to play the bells—but wearing masks—and began several weeks before practicing those pre-2020 Easter pieces. This morning during worship was our first bell choir performance since 2020. We were to play, *Fairest Lord Jesus*, which I enjoyed but felt my bell played an important role since I played my bell frequently—multiple notes almost every measure—and required playing immediately before and after turning music pages.

We had a practice session thirty minutes prior to the start of worship but with a short break as worshipers were arriving. I visited with a friend for a few minutes, and as we went to our seats, she said, "I guess you don't say, 'break a leg', for playing a bell, so 'break a clapper'."

The bell choir enthusiastically began playing *Fairest Lord Jesus* and then it happened. As I loudly played my bell, the whole thing fell apart with the clapper landing on the floor in front of the table, the actual bell and other pieces landed on the table in front me, and all I had was the bell handle in my hand.

The piece still had two pages to its end, so I just stood there—but listened—and finally realized that the music was still wonderful. Each time I had played my note, it was the top note in a chord—and that was my focus. So, my absence wasn't that obvious—unless you saw the bell fall apart—because my part was just one part of the chord which the others kept playing. The melody was still there, though not as full—just one note of several was missing in the harmony.

I did find this experience insightful—in a choir, be it one of voices or bells no one part is more important than the others—unless there is a solo part. All parts work together to bring full harmony to the piece. But if one part stops or breaks, the rest keep going to complete the piece. Maybe not quite at full harmony, but still the music was completed. While each part is important to the whole, in this case there was still enough music to be enjoyed. I'm glad I can be part of Peace Church's Bell Choir!



Peace Presbyterian has embraced its mission "...to make God known..." through strong education programs - both formal and informal – for all ages. This is particularly evident for Peace adults who have been blessed with many opportunities to be led by talented, devoted leaders who continue providing educational sessions even through the current pandemic. As 2021 comes to a close and 2022 begins, health and safety continue to be a major consideration



for educational activities as recommended by the Session. However, a few in-person classes are now available while other opportunities continue via Zoom. Please consult the weekly worship bulletin for specific information on attending programs.

Some hard copies will be available at church for those who prefer it that way. Offered by the Presbyterian Outlook, and provided by Peace church members, Night Watch ADVENT DEVOTIONS 2021, were written by editor Teri McDowell Ott. Each week includes a reflection, daily Scripture readings and a short prayer for each day.

Current and upcoming Adult Educational programs and classes are listed below:

Two new in-person classes are running November through December on Sundays at 11:30 a.m.:

• Younger Adults – Elizabeth Deibert is leading an in-person study for young adults and parents whose children attend CYF classes. This new study, titled Building Resilient Faith in Families, is meeting in Classroom #31 (East Hall)

• Older Adults – Richard Deibert and Bill Clough are leading the class, Celebrating Our Faith: An Engaging Conversation with the Catechism. The class meets in the Gathering Room (Front Hall, Room #23)

• Older Adults – Beginning in 2022, Mickey Miller will lead a new study on the New Testament book of I Peter. The class will meet in the Gathering Room (Front Hall, Room #23)

Classes and programs continuing to be provided remotely via Zoom (Zoom links for each are provided in the weekly worship service bulletin): **Bookworms**—(also called the Monday Night Book Study)—The Bookworms have a new format—only meeting once a month on the third Mondays of October, November, and December to lead discussions of an entire book for the month:

• November 22 – *JAMES BALDWIN REMINDS US NOT TO BE SURPRISED BY THIS.* Author is Brad R. Braxton, founding senior pastor of the Open Church in Baltimore and chief diversity, equity, and inclusion officer at St. Luke's School in New York City.

• November 29 – *I BELIEVE RACISM IS WRONG. SO WHAT?* Author is Teri McDowell Ott, chaplain at Monmouth College in Illinois.

• December 6 – *HOW DO WE KNOW BLACK LIVES MATTER TO GOD?* Author is Kelly Brown Douglas, who teaches theology at Union Theological Seminary in New York City, where she serves as dean of the Episcopal Divinity School. Her latest book is Stand Your Ground: Black Bodies and the Justice of God. Adult Education cont.

• December 13 – WHY ARE SO MANY WHITE AMERICANS STANDING UP FOR RACIAL JUSTICE? Author is Alan Sherouse, senior pastor of First Baptist Church in Greensboro, North Carolina.

Faith and Film

Led by David and Dotty Thomas with assistance by Eirinn Camphire and volunteers, Faith and Film begins its 2021–22 new season in September. It will continue to be held by Zoom. Check the listing of films on next page.

Men's Prayer & Bible Study

This group, led by Mickey Miller and Bill Clough, began around 15 years ago meeting on Tuesdays at 6:30 AM, currently via Zoom, with 9–10 regular attendees and several prayer partners with whom they share prayer concerns. Currently they are completing the Gospels.

Romeos

(Retired Old Men Eating Oranges)—Led by David Thomas and Wally Harman, Romeos began three years ago, and currently meet by Zoom. About 9 to 12 guys meet on Thursdays each week to discuss individual chapters in devotional books. Currently reading Scott Paulson's book, "70 Life Lessons," but after finishing it the participants will make recommendations or suggestions for the next book or readings.

Women's Bible Study

Susan Hyde and Kathleen Germano lead a group of 20-35 women on Wednesday mornings at 9:30 AM - now via Zoom. Using the Life Guide Bible Study curriculum, the women will complete studying Acts in November, and in December will begin studying Ruth.

Gratitude Team

Peace Presbyterian Church takes a different approach to stewardship than most churches.

While most churches seem to ask for money so they can meet a specific church budget or goal, the Gratitude team at Peace believes giving should reflect a person's gratefulness to God for all that has been given them.

Peace is actually running two campaigns this year – one for the annual Operating budget and the other for the three-year Building fund budget which is required by the Presbyterian Foundation which holds the mortgage on our sanctuary.

Besides many inspiring sermons given by Pastor Elizabeth, presentations have also been made during the past few weeks by Sue Seiter, Lydia Kaeyer, Diane Brinkmeyer, Robin Miller, and Grant Lowe highlighting the various ways that they have been grateful to Peace in their lives. This was culminated with our annual Gratitude Ice Cream Social held on Saturday, November 13th. Ingathering Sunday was the next day and while figures are far from being final, preliminary figures are encouraging.

To date, we have received 75 Operating fund pledges totaling \$353,091 and 68 three-year Building fund pledges totaling \$783,680 Based on the 105 pledges that we had last year, we still have a long way to go this year before final figures can be determined. We are not concerned however as the congregation of Peace is historically reflective of their blessings

and often take additional time to submit their pledges.

The Gratitude team is always extremely thankful and quite frankly humbled by the continuous response of our congregation in the generous support of their church. God has blessed us all and we are more than willing to give a portion back to God. Offering envelopes are now available at church. Thank you all for making this a wonderful gratitude season!





All good wishes for a happy holiday season, and a new year of joy, peace and health for us all.




