Elizabeth's Frequently Asked Questions about the Sanctuary

When will it be finished? *Likely June.*

How many people will it seat? *350 when you include the choir.*

Will we have stained glass windows? *Possibly one day, but real storm-proof windows are required and that is what we are installing this year.*

Will we have pews? *No we affirm the value of flexibility over the beauty of pews. Our chairs will be comfortable, padded, and connecting with an arc. Our initial order includes 50 armed chairs, and 200 regular chairs.*

Will we have one service or two? *Two, because we believe that meets the needs of more worshippers. We do not anticipate a schedule change.*

Will we have a screen in the middle? *No, we will have two screens on the sides of the front wall and one on the back wall.*

Will we move our communion table, pulpit, baptismal font, and welcome desk over there? *No, we have a Presbyterian minister craftsman who is designing and building a pulpit, font, table, and cross set for the new sanctuary. He will use some wood from our Live Oak trees on the property. We will have need for welcome desks in both buildings so a new one will be purchased for there.*

Will there be other rooms in the sanctuary building? *Yes, a large narthex (lobby), bathrooms, a communion prep room, and a tiny serving kitchen. We will continue to have offices, meetings, fellowship, and classes in the current building.*

Will it be accessible? *Yes, there will be an automatic door, accessible bathrooms, and a ramp to the chancel and choir. The communion table will be floor-level.*

What will we do with our current chapel? *It will become a Fellowship Hall, where we can enjoy coffee and refreshments weekly and dinners as needed. The Fellowship Café will work for classes and medium-sized group activities.*

Will the buildings match in color?

Yes, our Property Team is already preparing to paint the current building to match the sanctuary.

Will we have a sidewalk between the buildings? *Yes, but it will not be covered now—due to budget constraints.*

What about young children going to the nursery? *They will need very diligent supervision moving between the buildings. Parents may also decide to keep young children in the narthex, where the service may be seen and heard.*

Is all that dirt out there going to be parking area? *Yes, some of it grass parking and some paved.*

Will we complete payments on the sanctuary before moving in? *No, and thank you for asking. We are having a capital campaign this year to encourage strong giving in 2019-2021.*

What kinds of opening events are planned? *A soft opening in June, a Sunday afternoon Dedication service in the early fall, and a community-wide Grand opening on a Saturday in later fall.*

What are the other ideas and plans of the Building Vision Team? *A memorial garden with peaceful meditation path in the woods, a fenced play area for younger children, improvements at the front entrance on State Road 64 in the near future. In the long-range plan, an institutional kitchen and fellowship hall or other rooms between the two buildings.*

Making Headway on New Sanctuary


The next few weeks will see progress on the building and site. Sod will be added on the south parking aisle to stabilize the bank, and crushed concrete fill will stabilize the paved parking lanes. The building will be "Dried In" with a finished roof, windows, doors, and storefront entrances. Inside work will include temporary lights, roof deck spray

insulation, sprinkler piping, HVAC rough-in, mechanical & electrical rough-in. Interior framing and upper wall drywall installation will begin also. We are on schedule. More to follow as progress continues.

Taken in by the intelligent and independent Boatwright sisters, Lily finds solace in their mesmerizing world of beekeeping, honey and the Black Madonna.

Gratitude from the Gratitude Team

The Gratitude team wishes to thank the members of the congregation for a very successful 2018 Giving Campaign. This year's campaign was titled "Earn. Save. Give." It stressed the importance of stewardship – both within the church and outside of the church – including our time, talents, and money. Four classes were presented and were very well attended.

The generosity of our congregation is shown in the following statistics:

- The number of pledges increased by 7.2% over last year's pledges,
- 48.2% of members who pledged last year increased their pledges this year,
- We received 13 new pledges this year,
- And the total amount pledged was \$354,188 – an increase of 11.8% over 2017.

We believe that God has blessed Peace and as a result, its members give back a portion in sincere gratitude for those blessings.





But a cure to this uncertainty is faith. Faith and good friendships, both strengthened at Montreat.

The wilderness of the unknown can be overwhelming and consuming. It can make us lose our bearing of home since home is a transitory idea. This unpredictability can conjure nervousness, doubt, and fear. Rick Ufford-Chase, a keynote speaker, said that this can lead to tribalism and "othering" of anyone we do not identify with, but we are tasked as Christians to challenge this exclusion with diverse discourse and inclusion, even if it's not always easy to do so because "safety is not a Christian value." Moving closer and engaging others in discussion, rather than generalizing


